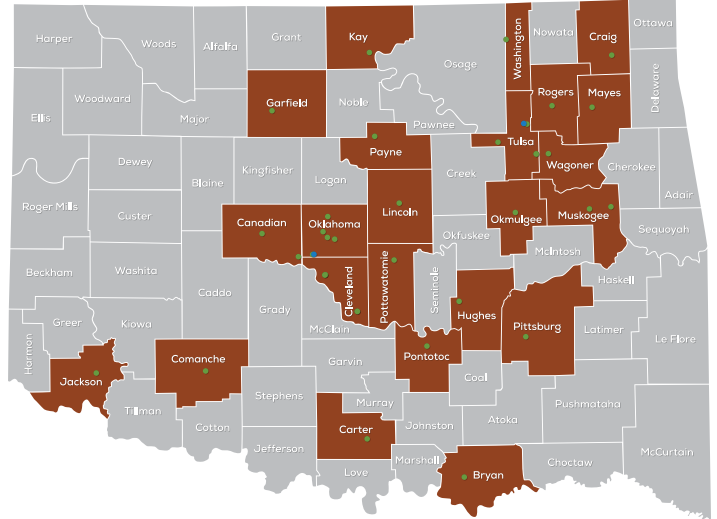

FUNDING

The Oklahoma National Guard (OKNG) received **\$451 million** from the federal government in fiscal year 2025 and **\$22 million** from the State General Revenue Fund in the state fiscal year 2025.

Federal funds pay for most of the OKNG's operations, maintenance, equipment, training, travel, and construction expenses. They include **\$55 million** in Federal Cooperative Agreement Funds granted to the state or administered by the state to support cost-share programs.

State General Revenue Funds come from state tax revenues that are annually appropriated to the Oklahoma Military Department (OMD) for the administration of the OKNG and provide the state's required share of the Master Cooperative Agreement. OMD Revolving Funds come from multiple sources to support OMD operations, the Oklahoma National Guard Museum, and the OKNG Soldier Relief Program. Federal Cooperative Agreement Funds are federal dollars reimbursed to the state for the federal share of operations executed.

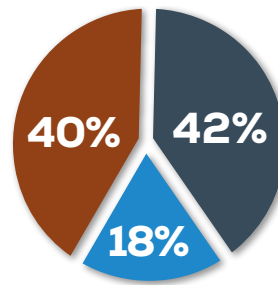

WORKFORCE

Between drill weekends, annual training periods, and deployments, the OKNG is trained, administered, and equipped through the efforts of **approximately 25%** of our force that makes up the full-time staff. They include Military Federal Technicians (Title 32), National Guard Federal Technicians (Title 5), Federal Active Guard Reserve (AGR) military members, state employees, and contractors. They are the core of the force, ensuring our traditional Guardsmen are ready to respond when called.

The vast majority of the Oklahoma National Guard federal employee workforce is dual-status (Title 32). Dual-status employees must maintain membership in the OKNG as a condition for employment.

The full-time workforce is augmented on an as-needed basis using Oklahoma Guard members on short-term military tours or Active Duty for Operational Support (ADOS) orders.

DOMESTIC OPERATIONS

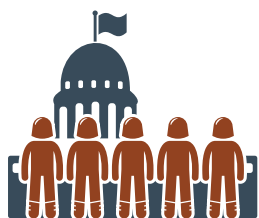
The Oklahoma National Guard (OKNG) plays a critical role in supporting civil authorities, one that differs from the typical responsibilities of Active Duty and Reserve units. When not deployed for federal missions, the OKNG is dedicated to serving the Governor and citizens of Oklahoma. As directed by the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, the OKNG assists federal, state, local, and tribal agencies in responding to both natural disasters and man-made crises. 2025 highlights include providing aviation support for stranded motorist assistance recovery team (SMART) missions; support for the 60th U.S. Presidential Inauguration, and National Guard Response Force security for the Oklahoma City Thunder NBA Championship Parade.

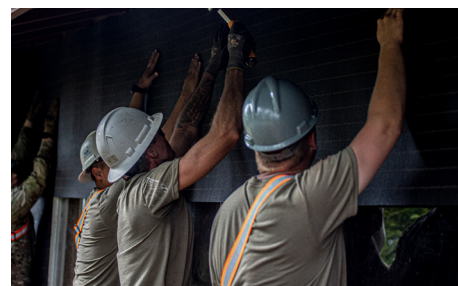

DOMESTIC OPERATIONS AND UNMANNED AERIAL SYSTEMS (UAS)

In 2025, the OKNG hosted its second annual Domestic Operations (DOMS) and Unmanned Aerial System (UAS) symposiums, marking milestones in fostering collaboration and innovation. The OKNG conducted two tactical UAS exercises during 2025, Exercise Thunderstruck 1.0 & 2.0, and has established a robust program in the sUAS domain, including recurring UAS Symposiums, war fighting, and domestic operational exercises. These efforts are characterized by collaboration with academic institutions, industry partners, law enforcement agencies, tribal governments, and emergency management organizations to address challenges in unmanned systems.

NATIONAL GUARD REACTION FORCE

The OKNG maintains a highly specialized and equipped National Guard Reaction Force (NGRF) designed to rapidly respond and provide critical support to law enforcement and security operations, able to deploy an initial force of 125 personnel within an eight-hour timeframe, followed by a larger contingent of up to 500 personnel within 24 hours. With rapid response capability, the NGRF helps bridge critical gaps and minimizes the impact of potential disruptions to essential services, public safety threats, and risks to life, property, and critical infrastructure.



DEFENSIVE CYBERSPACE OPERATIONS ELEMENT AND MISSION DEFENSE TEAM

The Army Defensive Cyberspace Operations Element (DCOE) and Air Mission Defense Team (MDT) serve as military cyber first responders to the Governor and The Adjutant General safeguarding Oklahoma commerce and privacy. The teams work with state and federal partners, conducting exercises, hosting preventative educational tabletops, helping baseline with vulnerability assessments, and providing incident response to mitigate damages.

In 2025, the cyber teams participated in both local and international events. Highlights include supporting the FBI's InfraGard Information Warfare Summit by hosting a Capture-the-Flag event, hosting a Capture-the-Flag event at Oklahoma's most prominent technology conference, InnoTech, where Oklahoma Management Enterprise Services (OMES) conducted a government track, and conducting tabletop exercises enhancing relationships necessary for incident response and promoting digital security for students at Oklahoma State University and the University of Central Oklahoma (UCO). The DCOE, MDT, OMES, OSU, AVEM and Red Threat traveled as one team to compete in the DoD's largest unclassified cyber exercise, Cyber Shield. Together, they won the live red vs. blue team week long CTF exercise.



63RD WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUCTION-CIVIL SUPPORT TEAM

The 63rd Weapons of Mass Destruction-Civil Support Team (WMD-CST) is integral to the Homeland Response Enterprise as a first response team to hazardous materials and man-made or natural disasters. Federally funded, resourced, and trained, the WMD-CST, when activated, deploys within one hour, providing Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear (CBRN) detection and identification equipment, a mobile laboratory, technical and emergency decontamination assets, and a mobile operations and communications suite. During disasters, the team is trained and capable of augmenting Task Force 1 and the Incident Commander in search and rescue operations.

In 2025, 62 operational missions were executed, providing CBRN support to local authorities and various state and local agencies, including chemicals surrounding illegal grow sites, white powder incidents, suspicious packages, and various unknown chemical responses. WMD-CST also provided emergency response to a radiation alert triggered by the University of Oklahoma Police Department, where the team quickly identified the source and location of the radiation upon arrival, an 8000-gallon leak of anhydrous ammonia in Weatherford and search and rescue operations. Additionally, the team participated in 16 distinct training exercises; highlights include collaboration with the Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL), full-scale exercise with the City of Lawton enabling the city to effectively utilize their emergency response systems and execute emergency response plans, exercise scenarios with fire departments throughout Oklahoma, and participation in over 18 local emergency manager engagements.

The Joint Hazard Assessment Team (JHAT), a WMD-CST partnership with state and local bomb squads, provides additional protection for the public during large sporting, gaming, and events through CBRN and explosive deterrence, detection, and response capabilities; highlights include support during the Oklahoma City Memorial Marathon, College Softball World Series, and home football games for OU and OSU.

OKLAHOMA NATIONAL GUARD COUNTERDRUG TASK FORCE

The Oklahoma National Guard Counterdrug Task Force (CDTF) supported the detection, interdiction, disruption, and curtailment of drug trafficking activities and use through the application of military-unique skills and resources in concert with inter-agency efforts to reduce the threat posed by drug-related Transnational Criminal Organizations to the State and the Nation. In fiscal year 2025, CDTF logged 158 hours of flight, trained federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement officers, provided cost-free support to 260 LEA and CBO operations, and educated 5,726 students in drug abuse and prevention.

OKLAHOMA NATIONAL GUARD MUSEUM

Created by Oklahoma State Legislature in 1965 and opened to the public in 1976, the Oklahoma National Guard Museum is located at 2145 NE 36th Street in Oklahoma City. It is Oklahoma's only state-operated museum dedicated to the history of the Oklahoma National Guard and the 45th Infantry Division. The museum is surrounded by a 15-acre military park containing over 50 vehicles, aircraft, and artillery pieces. Our mission is to collect, preserve, and interpret the impact of the Oklahoma National Guard's past, present, and future. Each year, more than 16,000 local, national, and international visitors tour the museum, providing an opportunity for education about the important history of the military in Oklahoma and emphasizing the role of the Oklahoma National Guard.

EXHIBITIONS AND COLLECTIONS

The museum staff continues to develop exhibition content for the new Oklahoma National Guard Museum while improving collections management and displays in the current museum.



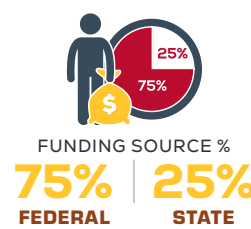

THUNDERBIRD YOUTH CHALLENGE (TYC)

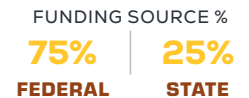
As Oklahoma's premier youth leadership program, Thunderbird Youth Challenge (TYC) has a mission to transform the lives of Oklahoma's youth by providing a quasi-military environment where "cadets" learn to overcome adversity, take ownership of their future, and develop essential leadership skills. The program instills discipline, responsibility, and integrity while empowering cadets to grow into resilient and engaged members of their communities.

TYC provides cadets with three distinct educational opportunities: Credit Recovery (allowing students to return to their local high school on a path to graduation), GED preparation, and High School Graduation.



SOONER JOB CHALLENGE (SJC)

Sooner Job Challenge is an optional next step for graduates of TYC. At SJC, "associates" will build upon the life and leadership skills they have developed at TYC while furthering their career readiness and vocational training with partner educational institutions who can provide trade certifications which support the associate's career pathway. SJC offers free career training, personalized support, and hands-on experience to propel the associate toward career success.



DOD STARBASE

DoD STARBASE is a premier educational program sponsored by the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower and Reserve Affairs. At STARBASE, students participate in challenging "hands-on, minds-on" activities in STEM. The program is aligned with Oklahoma's K-12 science standards and with the State's CareerTech/CTE pathway goals in an effort to enhance local school learning objectives. Each academy chooses a customized curriculum from a large offering of peer-reviewed learning opportunities in each STEM area, such as: Newton's Laws and Bernoulli's principle, robotics, and engineering as they use the computer to design space stations, all-terrain vehicles, and submersibles. Mathematics is embedded throughout the curriculum and students use metric measurement, estimation, calculation geometry, and data analysis to solve questions. STARBASE academies are primarily focused on 5th graders; however, STARBASE supports follow-on pathways for middle school STEM electives and high school STEM and CTE sequences.
