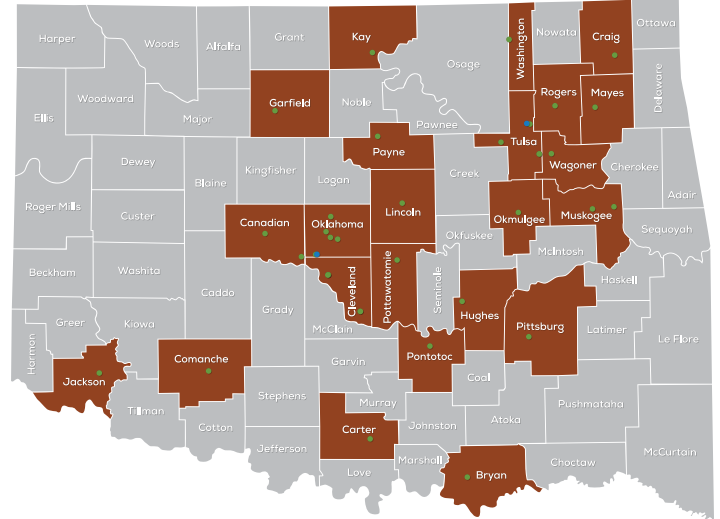

FUNDING

The Oklahoma National Guard (OKNG) received **\$378.1 million** from the federal government in fiscal year 2023 and **\$18.9 million** from the State General Revenue Fund in the state fiscal year 2023.

Federal funds pay for the majority of the OKNG's operations, maintenance, equipment, training, travel, and construction expenses. They include **\$44.2 million** in Federal

Cooperative Agreement Funds granted to the state or administered by the state to support cost-share programs.

State General Revenue Funds come from state tax revenues that are annually appropriated to the Oklahoma Military Department (OMD) for the administration of the OKNG and provide the state's required share of the Master Cooperative Agreement. OMD Revolving Funds come from multiple sources to support OMD operations, the Oklahoma National Guard Museum, and the OKNG Soldier Relief Program. Federal Cooperative Agreement Funds are federal dollars reimbursed to the state for the federal share of operations executed.

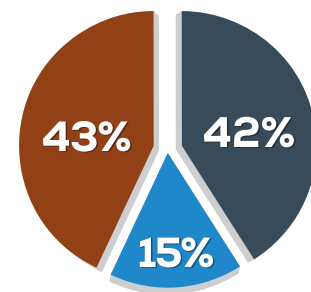

WORKFORCE

Between drill weekends, annual training periods, and deployments, the OKNG is administered, trained, and equipped through the efforts of **approximately 29%** of our force that makes up the full-time staff. They include Military Federal Technicians (Title 32), National Guard Federal Technicians (Title 5), Federal Active Guard Reserve (AGR) military members, state employees, and contractors. They are the core of the force, ensuring our traditional Guardsmen are ready to respond when called.

The vast majority of the Oklahoma National Guard federal employee workforce is dual-status (Title 32). Dual-status employees are required to maintain membership in the OKNG as a condition for employment.

The full-time workforce is augmented on an as-needed basis using Oklahoma Guard members on short-term military tours or Active Duty for Operational Support (ADOS) orders.

DOMESTIC OPERATIONS

The Oklahoma National Guard serves in a unique civil support role that Active Duty and Reserve typically do not. The OKNG serves the Governor and citizens of Oklahoma when not federally mobilized. Under the direction of the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, the OKNG is a resource for state, local, and tribal agencies responding to natural and man-made disasters. In 2023, more than 64 OKNG Soldiers and Airmen served the state and surrounding states by responding to domestic emergencies, including Louisiana aerial wildland fire suppression, Texas southwest border security assistance, and emergency water transport.

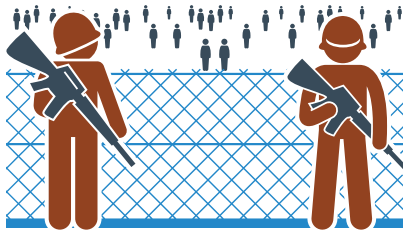

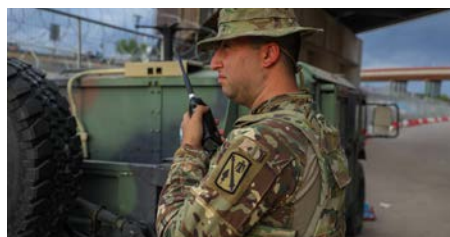
The Director of Military Support (DOMS) also provides several specialized capabilities to the state:

NATIONAL GUARD REACTION FORCE

The OKNG maintains a specially trained and equipped National Guard Reaction Force (NGRF) capable of rapid response to provide support to law enforcement or security. The NGRF can deliver an initial force of 125 personnel within eight hours and a follow-on force of up to 500 personnel within 24 hours. This capability fills critical gaps and mitigates the interruption of essential services, threats of public danger and suffering, risks to lives and property, public disorder, or destruction of critical assets.

DEFENSIVE CYBER OPERATION ELEMENT AND MISSION DEFENSE TEAM

The Defensive Cyber Operation Element and Mission Defense Team serve as military first responders to the Governor and The Adjutant General for cyber emergencies to ensure freedom of action in cyberspace. The teams are uniquely trained and equipped to protect state and local partners from cyber threats. The teams provide cyber vulnerability assessments to state or local government agencies to help protect networks and assist in damage mitigation after a cyberattack. The Defensive Cyber Operation Element won the DoD's largest unclassified cyber exercise in 2023 and has achieved first place in three of the last four years. This year was significant due to the partnership with OMES, the Department of Public Safety, and the University of Central Oklahoma.



63RD CIVIL SUPPORT TEAM – WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUCTION

The 63rd Civil Support Team (CST) serves an integral part of the Homeland Response Enterprise as a first response team to hazardous materials and man-made or natural disasters. Federally funded, resourced, and trained, the CST remains ready to respond to emerging Oklahoma threats and natural disasters.

When activated, the CST deploys within one hour, providing Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear (CBRN) detection and identification equipment, a mobile laboratory, technical and emergency decontamination assets, and a mobile operations and communications suite. The CST provides support in identifying agents or substances, assessing current and projected consequences, advising on response measures, and assisting with requests for additional support.

In 2023, the 63rd CST conducted three State Partnership Program engagements, participated in 42 multi-agency engagements, exercises, or training events, and executed 15 civil support missions. The CST partnered with state and local bomb squads to create a Joint Hazard Assessment Team (JHAT). The JHAT provides an additional level of protection for the public during large sporting, gaming, and gathering events through the use of CBRN and explosive deterrence, detection, and response capabilities. JHAT highlights include support to the Gubernatorial Inaugural Events, Oklahoma City Memorial Marathon, Super Bowl 52, Waste Management Open, Kentucky Derby, and home football games for OU and OSU. Additionally, the CST provided CBRN response support to the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics, Drug Enforcement Administration, and various other state and local agencies by characterizing several unknown chemicals and biologicals.



OKLAHOMA NATIONAL GUARD COUNTERDRUG PROGRAM

The Oklahoma National Guard Counterdrug Program (CDP) provides domestic support to civilian authorities and law enforcement agencies. Soldiers and Airmen provide five major support services: case analytics, ground observation and reconnaissance, aviation observation and reconnaissance, drug demand reduction operations (DDRO), and linguist support.

Personnel can be trained and deployed quickly in support of drug interdiction and drug demand reduction missions. Additionally, OKNG CDP provides support in drug demand reduction and analytical, medical, and tactical training efforts across the state to law enforcement and prevention coalitions. In fiscal year 2023, CDP trained and educated 258 federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement officers at no cost to their supported agencies and educated 1,643 students in drug abuse and prevention. One hundred seven flight hours were also flown, and DDRO clocked 525 manhours with 23,610 participants.

THUNDERBIRD CHALLENGE PROGRAM

The Thunderbird Challenge Program's mission is to take at-risk youth and give them discipline and the tools they need to plot a new course in life. The goal is to return at-risk youths to their homes with high school diplomas, additional high school credits, GEDs, and/or vocations to become successful, productive citizens within their communities. Founded in 1993, the Thunderbird Challenge Program is part of the Department of Defense and National Guard's Youth Challenge Program. It is one of 40 such programs nationwide and one of the original 10 national pilot programs.



PROGRAM EDUCATION

The Thunderbird Challenge Program has developed a partnership with Epic Charter Schools and offers three different education opportunities to cadets. Thunderbird is one of the few challenge programs in the nation that offers this diversity in education opportunities.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION:

The Thunderbird Challenge Program offers the capability for eligible cadets to attain a high school diploma through our partnership with Epic Charter Schools.

GED CERTIFICATE:

This program is available for cadets who are not in a position to receive a high school diploma. Cadets are provided training during the cycle, and the GED exam is administered at the end.

HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT RECOVERY:

High school courses and credits are available through our partnership with Epic Charter Schools. The goal is to return cadets to their local high school on a path to receiving their high school diploma.

OKLAHOMA NATIONAL GUARD MUSEUM

Created by Oklahoma State Legislature in 1965 and opened to the public in 1976, the Oklahoma National Guard Museum is located at 2145 NE 36th Street in Oklahoma City. It is Oklahoma's only state-operated museum dedicated to the history of the Oklahoma National Guard and the 45th Infantry Division. The museum is surrounded by a 15-acre military park containing over 50 vehicles, aircraft, and artillery pieces. Our mission is to collect, preserve, and interpret the impact of the Oklahoma National Guard's past, present, and future. Each year, more than 16,000 local, national, and international visitors tour the museum, providing an opportunity for education about the important history of the military in Oklahoma and emphasizing the role of the Oklahoma National Guard.

EXHIBITIONS AND COLLECTIONS

The museum staff continues to develop exhibition content for the new Oklahoma National Guard Museum while improving collections management and displays in the current museum.
